From our Priest-in-charge

Advent Greetings!

When this copy of the Cross Border arrives in your hand, or in your inbox, we will just have celebrated the start of Advent – my favourite liturgical season.

Advent signals many things. At a very practical level, the start of the new liturgical year. In the year that has just ended (2013-2014) we were making our way through the Gospel according to Matthew, getting to know the Jewish heritage of Jesus and of our faith.

In this liturgical year (2014-2015, Year B) we'll be reading, meditating upon and discussing the Gospel according to Mark. It's Mark who provides us with another aspect of Advent.

Mark begins his Gospel narrative with the words, "the beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." And that good news? "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent and believe in the good news."

So, of all the many things that could and will be said, and written about Advent, let me mention just one:

Advent is an opportunity for new beginnings.

In the growing frenzy of last minute shopping, rekindled communications with friends and family, and all manner of catering delights and bottles of "Christmas cheer", we, the People of God, are invited to set time aside for silence and reflection, time which has the potential to lead us into a growing consciousness, and awakening, of God's outpouring of love in the Christ child. It is this love which enabled Mary to say, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour", which filled the angels' hearts with song, the shepherds' hearts with awe, and called the wise men from the East to pay homage.

It is the good news, this love in the heart of God, so great that he gave his only Son, that calls us to change direction, to repentance, *a metanoia*, when we turn around one hundred and eighty degrees, and set our face towards the kingdom of God.

And so I invite you to join with me, each day of Advent, as we pray the Collect for the First Sunday in Advent: (page 2)

Almighty God, as your kingdom dawns, turn us from the darkness of sin to the light of holiness, that we may be ready to meet you in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

God grant each of us, and all those whom we love and remember at this time, a holy Advent, and a Joy-full Christ-mass.

CENTRE OF HELP FOR ETHIOPIA

News has arrived from the above charity, to which we subscribe, that Tekalign Denba, now 18 years old, has left the Centre. He has been our 'adopted' child from a distance for the last fourteen years and we have followed his schooling, supported him and his family when his brother died, and seen him grow into a fine looking young man.

We have now been invited to follow another boy, Fraol ABERA, born in Addis Abeba 1/1/2008. Fraol lives with his father, brother and two sisters in Gulele. Sadly, his mother is dead. The family lives in rented premises and his father is self-employed. We are told Fraol already attends the St. Francis School but, being classed as from a poor family, he needs our help in financing his studies.

Barbara Caula has visited the Centre and seen the good work they do in many isolated villages in the area around Addis Abeba. As well as schooling, there are courses to prepare for work in agriculture, building, sewing. There are day centres for hospital care and hygiene classes; wells are dug to provide clean water for neighbouring villages. The Centre is based on Christian values with its own churches. An annual contribution is made to cover one year's schooling.

RIP - Sandra Ann Lawson (1950-2014)

The church was shocked at the sudden death of Sandra on 4 November from a heart attack. On 14 November her family and friends gathered in St. Roch's Chapel for the funeral service led by Fr. David. Birgitt Nordbrink, Chairman of the British Association in Menton, gave the eulogy. After cremation, Sandra's ashes were interred in St. John's garden.

A member of the church council, Sandra was responsible for communications and the library. As a friend in the UK observed: 'Sandra wrote an email the day before she died. She was full of hope and plans for the future, with her knitting projects etc.'

Her warm friendliness will be greatly missed.

Women Bishops in the Church of England

Measures paving the way for the appointment of women as bishops in the Church of England received Royal assent from Queen Elizabeth II on 23 October. House of Commons Speaker John Bercow told the Commons that the Bishops and Priests (Consecration and Ordination of Women) Measure, agreed by both Houses of Parliament in early October, had cleared its final legal hurdle with sign-off from the Palace. The Church of England General Synod met on November 17 to formally conclude the process, and women are now eligible to fill vacancies, and it is possible that a woman might be appointed bishop in the Church of England by the end of this year, or early in the new year.

We give thanks to God for his leading us through this long, and sometimes difficult process. Let us continue to pray for those women and men whom God calls to episcopal ministry.

Almighty God, the giver of all good gifts,

by your Holy Spirit you have appointed various orders of ministry to the Church; look with mercy on your servants now called to be bishops; maintain them in truth and renew them in holiness, that by word and good example they may faithfully serve you to the glory of your name and the benefit of your Church, who is alive and reigns with you,

Bishop Robert's Advent Appeal 2014 One year after the tragedy off Lampedusa

I am writing this letter on the anniversary of the Lampedusa migrant shipwreck. On 3rd October 2013, a 20 metre fishing boat carrying migrants from Africa caught fire and sank just off the southernmost point of Italy, killing over 300 people. The tragedy was marked by a day of mourning in Italy. The European Commissioner for Home Affairs said "Let's make sure what happened in Lampedusa will be a wake-up call to increase solidarity and mutual support and to prevent similar tragedies in the future."

Following the Lampedusa tragedy, the Italian government has launched the Operation "Mare Nostrum" with a wide scope to save and rescue persons in distress at sea. Despite this impressive operation, many other tragic incidents have happened and still happen in Greek, Italian, Spanish, Cypriot or Maltese waters. The sea tragedies remind us of the plight of all those fleeing war and conflict – people desperate to find sanctuary in the relative safety of Europe. At the present time, we are particularly conscious of those escaping cruelty and destruction in Middle East, particularly refugees from Syria nd Iraq.

In this light, I present to you my first Advent Appeal as Bishop with the intention that our European diocese can express solidarity with some of the most vulnerable people in Europe.

The Lampedusa Sanctuary – on the hillside above Taggia is the Sanctuary; a thanksgiving votive made by a local shipwrecked sailor in the 1600s. The sailor, Andrea Anfosso, found safety from pirates by escaping from his ship on the Island of Lampedusa and tying a painting of the Virgin Mary and Child to a dug-out tree trunk, thus making a rudimentary boat. Sailing from Lampedusa he made a safe landing on the Ligurian coast. Together with his village friends from Taggia the decision was made to build the Sanctuary as a thanksgiving for his safe return.

If you visit the Sanctuary the painting can be seen behind the altar.
