**Barbara's bottle** Visitors and residents alike are invited to save their coins and put them in the bottle at the back of the chapel every Sunday. Doing this lightens your purses and improves the finances of the church. Thank you.

**Financial Situation** The annual Financial Update of St. John's Church for 2017 showed some large exceptional cash flows, in common with 2016. This is due to the costs of rebuilding parts of the church fabric and assuming ownership of the church and land when it passes to us from the United Society.

However, the good news is that 2018 has started well and instead of showing annual shortfalls of about  $\in$ 16,000 (2016) and  $\in$ 4,000 (2017) there may be a net surplus at the end of the year 2018! It would be a well deserved reward for all of the hard work done by the Council and community.

<u>Income details</u> Income for the year 2017 was €30,700 including a donation of €11,500 from the Dewhurst Foundation. This sum is being used to restore and protect the church windows.

Sunday collections at €9,900 were similar to 2016, and were quite reassuring as we moved from having a permanent priest to a series of locums, which might have affected attendance and contributions.

Outgoing details for 2017 Outgoings were  $\[ \in \]$ 45,000 down from  $\[ \in \]$ 95,000. Exceptional items include  $\[ \in \]$ 6,000 for the rent of the St Roch Chapel,  $\[ \in \]$ 7,000 for church windows,  $\[ \in \]$ 7,000 for pew and library storage.

#### RESULT OF BISHOP ROBERT'S ADVENT APPEAL 2017 - £15,394-63p

From the Diocesan website we learn:

Bishop Robert was delighted with the result of his 2017 Advent Appeal which aimed to support homeless refugees and asylum seekers in Rome with humanitarian assistance (a daily, cooked breakfast and essential items for personal dignity and warmth) for 6 months. This is through a well-established and well-run project established by our Episcopal sister church of St. Paul's Within the Walls in Rome.

The Joel Nafuma Refugee Center assists approximately 17,000 people per year, and is the only day center open to receive homeless asylum seekers and refugees in Rome. Every day JNRC welcomes 200-250 guests. The guests come from many different nations including Mali, Afghanistan, Eritrea, Somalia, Pakistan, Guinea and the Ivory Coast. Half of them are homeless, sleeping in parks, or on the pavement outside train stations.

While they wait for shelter, they are welcomed by JNRC, given a nutritious, cooked breakfast, as well as items for their personal dignity (toiletries, second-hand shoes, clothes and blankets) and offered legal advice. If they wish they can join a language session, learn to use a computer, or simply watch the news on the TV. JNRC has a multi-faith prayer space where guests can meditate and pray. JNRC is the only place in Rome that takes in homeless and dormitory-housed refugees during the day, giving them a safe refuge from the streets.

## MEMORIES OF A USPG\* MISSIONARY - (Continued) by Bernard Bligh

#### **Optician**

The bishop wanted me to start a rehabilitation centre. I drove the doctor, the matron, and a nurse to the places where families kept their handicapped members out of sight, and everybody gathered round for a public open-air clinic. Two things became clear: nobody wanted to be put to work, and about half had eye problems. The bishop was very cross when I said his plan had no future, but he had to listen when a World Health Organisation expert told him the same.

The man who taught me to test eyes was very generous. He invited me to live in his house for a week and to spend every day in his consulting room. When I asked him why he was so generous, he said it was because he was a freemason. The Lions Club paid for the equipment. I had glasses made to measure and prescription by a firm in South Africa, and charged cost price to my patients. That made me the fourth supplier of glasses in a country with ¾ million people. By the time I left Botswana I had supplied more than a thousand pairs of glasses.

#### Communism

In later years I tested eyes in a government hospital, sharing the consulting room of a Chinese lady eye surgeon. One day I heard an argument behind me and, when my patient had left, found an old lady needed a cataract operation and could not pay the fee, which was less than a pound. I paid it and later the surgeon and her interpreter came to ask how I would get it back. There were thirteen in the Chinese medical team. Once a week I gave them an English lesson and they gave me a Chinese meal. They could not understand why I would not accept a fee because Christians are meant to help people for no reward. They could not understand Christianity any more than I could understand communism. When I started to test eyes, people asked if I could do teeth.

#### **Bewitched**

A head teacher lived in one of the mission houses. I was told to make him pay his rent, so I did. He got the traditional doctor to bewitch me, and the whole village watched. When nothing happened to me some people thought it might be because I did not believe in spirits, others thought it didn't work because I was a white man. Later on, at a secondary school, I led assembly for a week from time to time. I said once that I would talk about a different prophet each day. To show what is not meant by prophecy, I said that on a certain date assembly would be cancelled because of heavy rain. It was; this was a safe bet because in every year but one in recent times the autumn rains had started on that date – how else would the rainmakers be so successful? My 'prophecy' misfired: everybody said "Sorcery!"

A chicken farmer living near – four miles away is near in a desert – was taken before the district commissioner by his wife who complained that she was not receiving her share of the profits. He was told to come back with his accounts. I wrote his accounts and put on the front a note showing that his wife received most of the profit, his son came next, and he came last. The accounts never reached the district commissioner. The wife read the note, burnt the accounts and said that was the end of that.

#### Train!

The head of a village school came, with a boy carrying a length of pipe. Would I thread it? Without once touching the pipe, I took the boy step-by-step through the whole process. The boy went away delighted: he could now thread a pipe. The head said, "I see a boy as someone to carry a pipe. You see him as someone to train." I said that was how the rich nations grow richer.

#### **Driving lessons**

I taught four hospital workers to drive. It took a hundred hours each time. Once the examiner failed the truck, not the driver. Another driver failed the test and said that he could not face the shame of failing a second time. The woman driver passed. When she went to a government filling station for petrol she was told it was unthinkable that a woman should bring a truck for petrol, and she had to go away and find a man.

#### Gratitude

When our doctor was away, if there was a difficult birth at night I would take the patient and a nurse by truck to a government hospital ten miles away. I always asked the nurse whether to give her an easy ride or get there fast, and the answer was always to get there fast. A couple of weeks after one of these journeys, a mother came to my door with all her relatives in their best clothes to show me the baby and say thank you. This is the nicest thing that has ever happened to me. The church gave the hospital to the government, and I lost my job after four years. When I left, to manage a school, the chief addressed me as *Rraetšo*, father of our people. This was a great honour, but not as moving as the family's thanks.
