Reflections from our chaplain Chris

'Living in hope'

Advent is a season of hope. We remember the hope 2,000 years ago as Mary, Joseph and others started to realise what might be about to happen through the birth of a child, Jesus. We celebrate that time in history, and also look o live it today, in hopeful expectation that God is bringing in a new kingdom.

What does it mean live a hopeful life? Richard Bauckham, a thologian who has written much on the theme of hope, writes, 'if we live in hope, a hope shaped decisively by the imaginative resources of scripture, invested in the God who raised Jesus from death and loves life, and open to the boundless possibilities of the Holy Spirit is the domain of the future, then we shall truly **be** the church in a way that the church has often not been.

What does that mean for us, here at St. John's Menton? It has already been a year since we arrived at St. John's. How the time has flown! As I look back over the year, moments and reflections that have inspired me with hopefulness spring to mind.

There is the faithful commitment of the council and other core members of the church who 'gritted it out' and saw the church through the time of building closure, renovations, and brought us to where we are today. There are the positive comments from visitors after our Sunday services who comment on the warmth and inspiration they have experienced. There are the diverse and fascinating conversations and interactions I have had in the Library, at ervents and during opening hours, with the various people who pass by. There are the more personal moments when people share how they are feeling encouraged in their journey of faith, even if life is not always easy. There are times when we have specifically welcomed the children and young families to our services, which have reminded me what a gift it is to experience all age community. And the good news of a community compost initiative launched near the chuirch where we can take our compost!

They are not the only examples. Some of these might seem trivial, too small to mention But added up, they give me a sense of hope. And the world needs hope. May we all find hope in this Advent season!

Our Financial situation at St. John's should be well known by now. It was on the Agenda at the AGM; our treasurer Bob Edwards spoke about it in church as did Chris in two of his sermons on Generosity. The following article is on our website and now in the Cross Border for all to read and think on and do:

Where we are

After years of building works and a sense of being 'on the road' for St. John's, we are now where we feel called to be: back in our own building and with a growing church community and presence!

In 2022, we,

- Completed the building works
- Appointed our new priest
- Completed renovations on the church flat
- Provided regular Sunday worship in the church, beautifully enhanced by the use of the new organ
- Hosted various events in the church and enabled the St. John's English Library to flourish in our own buildings with its own events and meetings
- Enabled various groups to use the church buildings
- Paid the bills!

Thanks to the generosity of our church members and the wider community, we have come a long way!

Now, for the first time in years, for 2023 we have a budget which reflects our 'post building context'.

Our Budget for 2023

Based on past experience, our 2023 budget is $39K \in \text{however}$ we anticipate our expenses to be around $66K \in \text{.}$

The reality of our budget shows that we are operating an annual **deficit of around 27K \in.** Our reserves are around $110K \in$.

If we change nothing, we will have run out of money in around four years. We want to change this in the coming years for the church to continue to survive and strive. We trust and pray that with everyone's help, we can! (5)

For example, (and ignoring any additional tax advantages, noted below):

- If 10 people each gave 20€ per week more, that would raise an additional 20,000€.
- If 50 people each gave 10€ more each week, that would wipe out the deficit!

Where we are going

As an English-speaking Anglican church in the heart of Menton, we are a friendly community of different nationalities, seeking to know, live and proclaim God's love in Menton and the surrounding areas. We aspire to welcome everyone as they are, and seek to be a place where everyone – no matter where they are on the journey of faith – can find friendship and suppport. We are blessed with our wonderful committed church community, and want to grow both in depth and numbers. We want to reach out and become ever more welcoming, faithful, inspiring, hopeful and joyful. But to do this we need over time to be able to balance our budgets!

We are asking you to consider and review your giving as we work towards making our finances more sustainable for the long-term

How you can help

'We love because God first loved us'. 1 John 4.19

Generosity and giving is a fundamental marker of Christian spirituality. We are called to give from a sense of abundance, knowing that we already have received the gift of life ourselves.

A famous prayer of St. Francis says 'It is in giving that we receive'

We all have different circumstances and we all different gifts. Giving is not just a matter of giving our money; it is about giving of ourselves, our time and our energy. Each of us is called to discern what the right balance is in each of our lives. But we are all called to give!

Historically, the church has often taught the biblical principle of tithing, suggesting people give 10% of their income. Of course, we might want to give to many charities and initiatives. We are also so different, with such different circumstances, so it is not appropriate to be too legalistic in our thinking. Fundamentally, we are called to give! **Details on how to give are below.**

Here are some principles that might help:

- Generosity is part of our faith and our giving should come from a sense of abundance.
- Our giving needs to be realistic about the needs of our church community life.
- Our giving needs to be planned so that we balance appropriately the needs of our families and loved ones, our communities, and ourselves.
- We are not all called to give the same amount. Within the church community there should be a sense of equally shared sacrifice: those with more can afford to give more; those with less can give less!

How to respond.

Please prayerfully consider your giving over this month, and let us know what you are able to give now and over the next year. We understand we each have different calls on our finances, and we want to be sensitive to everyone's circumstances.

Once you are ready to respond, please contact our treasurer Bob Edwards either in church or by email, to tell him of any gift you will be making and Bob can provide more details as needed. The information will be completely confidential to Bob.

Supporting women in Pakistan and South India, addressing violence, discrimination, and poverty. Donate to make a difference

As the Diocese in and for Europe, we are deeply aware of our international context; perhaps we're also well-placed, then, to think internationally, outside Europe itself. I'm delighted to say we will be supporting this Advent the Anglican Common Fund of the Archbishop of Canterbury. It exists to make small investments across the church; in the right hands, these can have great impact.

The focus of this year's work is South Asia, with which I now myself feel a special link, after my sabbatical in that part of the world in early 2023.

<u>Pakistan</u> The Bishop's wife in the Diocese of Sialkot, in Punjab Province, is leading and teaching women about their rights and protection for them to pass on to young women. Sessions on the law of Pakistan educate women about domestic violence and harassment; girls are given strength and confidence to recognise the protection they need.

The Church of South India is starting a programme for young women aged 18 to 28, particularly in rural areas, to study home care nursing and health care. After completing a basic course, some will go on to higher level training and others will work in some of the CSI Mission hospitals.

<u>Hpa-An Diocese</u> A grant from the the church to purchase and distribute rice – both to Christian families and to the very poor of other faiths, feeding the hungry and serving as a witness to God's love in this area touched by conflict, natural disaster and other maladies.
